A Christmas Carol by Charles Dickens

Give out one sentence per child. Using the Voice 21 groupings of 'Onion' or 'Traverse', each child reads their sentence to the child opposite them and spends one minute discussing the clues and what the story could be about. They could also just move around the class choosing other children at random. When they move on, they use the new and previous clues to guess the following aspects of the story, piecing together evidence to back up their theories. You may wish to use our 'Book Knowledge Organisers' to go through the book in more detail at the end if you or the children are unfamiliar with the story.

- 8.) The darkness and the mist had vanished with it, for it was a clear, cold, winter day, with snow upon the ground.

- 10.) The crisp leaves of holly, mistletoe, and ivy reflected back the light, as if so many little mirrors had been scattered there;

- 14.) Where angels might have sat enthroned, devils lurked, and glared out menacing.
- 15.) The Phantom slowly, gravely, silently, approached.
- 16.) ...an animal that growled and grunted sometimes, and talked sometimes, and lived in London...
- 17.) 'What has he done with his money?'
- 18.) The finger pointed from the grave to him, and back again.
- 19.) I will honour Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year.
- 20.) He had been sobbing violently in his conflict with the Spirit, and his face was wet with tears.
- 21.) I am as light as a feather, I am as happy as an angel, I am as merry as a school-boy.
- 22.) Come back with the man, and I'll give you a shilling. Come back with him in less than five minutes, and I'll give you half-a-crown!'
- 23.) He became as good a friend, as good a master, and as good a man, as the good old city knew, or any other good old city, town, or borough, in the good old world.
- 24.) It was a large house, but one of broken fortunes.
- 25.) Five minutes, ten minutes, a quarter of an hour went by, yet nothing came.



- 26.) This idea taking full possession of his mind, he got up softly and shuffled in his slippers to the door.
- 27.) 'If these shadows remain unaltered by the Future, the child will die.'
